### 2010 STATE EXAMINATIONS

116,334 Students Sit Exams This Year

## Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> June 2010

On Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> June 2010, some 116,334 candidates will take their seats at almost 4,700 examination centres countywide to begin their Leaving and Junior Certificate examinations.

Mr. Richard Langford, Chairman of the State Examinations Commission (SEC), sends his best wishes and those of his fellow Commissioners on behalf of the Commission to all sitting the state examinations in 2010. He said: "The significance of the state examinations in the lives of candidates and their families cannot be underestimated. The examinations are a matter of public interest and the events surrounding the re-schedule of Leaving Certificate English Paper 2 last year show how any disruption to the examination schedule can impact on all those involved. The Commissioners play a custodial role in safeguarding the examinations and one of our over-riding concerns is maintaining public confidence in the quality and integrity of the examinations system. As an organisation we have looked carefully at what happened last year and we have put in place a series of measures so that the 2010 examinations will proceed as scheduled. I wish all those sitting examinations this year every success."

The SEC has introduced enhanced procedures for the 2010 examinations with the intention of reducing the likelihood of an event, similar to that which led to the reschedule of Leaving Certificate English Paper 2, from occurring again. For the 2010 examinations the SEC has:

- Amended the examination timetable so that no subject with two written examinations will be held either on two mornings or two afternoons in order to clearly distinguish the packets of papers from each other;
- Introduced a superintendent partnering system for the validation of the examination paper packets before each examination session commences;
- Provided specific directions to superintendents to contact the SEC if something should occur which may threaten the integrity of the examination process;
- Redesigned the examination paper packets and the examination packet labels to prioritise the key information and instructions;

- Instructed superintendents to distribute all examination papers **face-up** so that it is immediately apparent that the correct examination paper has been given out for the session;
- Updated and revised the training and instructions for Superintendents, including development of a set of "Golden Rules", which reminds superintendents of their core duties and responsibilities;
- Developed enhanced communication strategies to deal with school authorities and superintendents;
- Developed an enhanced contingency model to provide for greater agility in responding to critical incidents.

From the June bank holiday weekend, the 4,700 superintendents involved in supervising the written examinations will take possession of the boxes containing the 3 million examination papers that are required by candidates over the 13-day examination period. Almost 4,000 examiners will be involved in examining the work presented by candidates in the written examinations. This is in addition to the some 2,000 examiners required to mark the oral and practical tests.

The examinations run until Thursday 24<sup>th</sup> June for Junior Certificate subjects and Friday 25<sup>th</sup> June for Leaving Certificate subjects. The written examinations in the Leaving Certificate Applied programme finish on Thursday 17<sup>th</sup> June. The results of the Leaving Certificate examinations will be available on Wednesday, the 18<sup>th</sup> August 2010. Results of the Junior Certificate will be available in mid-September 2010.

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### 1. Key Logistics

Established in 2003, the SEC assumed responsibility from the Department of Education and Science for the operation of the second level examinations of the Irish state: the Junior Certificate and the Leaving Certificate. The SEC is based at Cornamaddy, Athlone, Co. Westmeath.

The SEC employs some 170 permanent staff; this number is supplemented by some 90 temporary staff to assist in key seasonal functions such as the packing and distribution of examination material and the examination resulting process.

To give an idea of the scale of activities involved in conducting the state examinations it is worth noting that the 2009 examinations involved the following activities and outcomes

- ➤ Providing examinations to **113,018 candidates** across all examination programmes; **55, 557** at Junior Certificate, **54,197** at Leaving Certificate, and
- ➤ **3,264** at Leaving Certificate Applied Programme
- ➤ Arranging for **examinations** in **90** curricular and **15** non-curricular subjects examination subjects
- Engaging **664 drafters**, setters and translators to develop **254** different test instruments including oral tests, aural recordings, practical briefs, project briefs, portfolio and coursework items as well as the written examination papers
- Producing approx 3.1 million examination papers made up of approx 38 million A4 pages
- Arranging for the recording of some **84**, **546** oral tests
- Engaging **4,655** superintendents to superintend at **4,607** ordinary examination centres
- ➤ Providing 17,233 reasonable accommodations to facilitate candidates with individual needs to access the certificate exams and establishing 7,587 special examination centres as a result
- Engaging **6,469 examiners** to mark the examinations; **4,174 written** examiners, **1,130 oral** examiners and **1,165 practical** examiners
- Examining some 1.9 million individual test items including written examination scripts, art and craftwork pieces, project and practical pieces in Leaving Certificate Construction Studies and Engineering and Junior Certificate Metalwork, Materials Technology (Wood) and Technology, oral tests, coursework journals, research reports and portfolios
- ➤ Generating 966,634 individual grades leading to the award of 113,018 examination results
- > Returning **338,955 marked scripts** to schools for viewing
- ➤ Processing some 12,712 appeals at Leaving and Junior Certificate

## 2. Non-Curricular EU Language Subjects

The SEC also provides examinations in a range of subjects in the language area referred to as the non-curricular EU languages. These are languages which do not appear as part of the normal school curriculum but which students may opt to be examined in if they meet certain criteria. Chief among these conditions are the requirements that candidates for these examinations;

- Be from a member state of the European Union
- Speak the language in which they opt to be examined in as a mother tongue
- Have followed a programme of study leading to the Leaving Certificate
- Be taking Leaving Certificate English

Another condition is that candidates may undertake examination in one non-curricular language subject only.

For the 2010 Leaving Certificate examinations, candidates will be examined in the following fifteen non-curricular language subjects:

•	Czech	•	Greek (Modern)	•	Portuguese
•	Dutch	•	Hungarian	•	Romanian
•	Danish	•	Latvian	•	Slovakian
•	Estonian	•	Lithuanian	•	Swedish
